Though Scotland ended up winning quite a few of the trophies the overall competition was very close, with a number of games separated by a single goal and the opening Minis match between Scotland and Wales ended in a draw. All weekend all four nations competed incredibly hard with the players and their horses demonstrating some brilliant skills.
